

Success of First AMIS Project

Thanks to the generous donations from AMIS in the USA, we have successfully reached out to the AMIS in France. Just as André Michaux himself did two hundred years ago, we have successfully sent trees from the USA to France for the parks at Rambouillet. Most of Michaux's great bald cypress trees at Rambouillet survived two centuries of disease and war only to be blown down in the hurricane that struck northern France in 1999. Assisted by Starhill Forest Arboretum in IL, AMIS sent a package of bald cypress seeds in November and followed with 40 hardwood seedlings by air freight from Woodlanders Nursery in SC in February. The AMIS trees arrived in Rambouillet in the late afternoon of 18 February where they were greeted with fanfare at City Hall by a welcoming committee led by Gérard Clerc, President of the Rambouillet AMIS, in the presence of the local press.

These small two-year old seedlings (5 each of 8 species) are now planted in the city green houses where the municipal head gardener watches their growth. As soon as they are acclimatized and have reached a certain size, they will be divided between the park of the presidential Domain and the City of Rambouillet.

Middleton Place's New Yellowwood Tree

Everyone knows of Middleton Place National Historic Landmark's long and proud relationship with the horticultural legacy of André Michaux. Michaux's "Queen of Flowers" camellia is one of the treasures of this oldest landscaped garden in America. A new chapter began March 15, 2004 when Middleton Place accepted the gift of a yellowwood tree, Cladrastis lutea, from the Jackson County Historical Society in Gainesboro, TN. Michaux discovered the rare and beautiful yellowwood near Gainesboro on March 2, 1796. Middleton Place accepted the yellowwood in remembrance of André Michaux for his contributions to both Charleston and Jackson County over 200 years ago. Jackson County Historical Society President Ronny West and his wife Donnietta, who presented the yellowwood to Middleton Place, have been invited to join the AMIS delegation traveling to Rambouillet in July.



Michaux Symposium Issue of Castanea

Mike Baranski, the assigned Editor-in-Charge and Lytton Musselman Assistant Editor, report that the review process is on schedule with December 2004 the planned publication date. Some papers are still in review, but between 17 and 20 of the presentations at AMIS May 17-18, 2002 at Belmont Abbey College are likely to be published as finished papers in this special issue of *Castanea*.

Michaux in East Tennessee

Tipton-Haynes State Historic Site in Johnson City opened its exhibit on Michaux in fine style April 3rd. After Charlie Williams entertained and informed the group with his presentation in period costume of André Michaux arriving at Colonel Tipton's in 1795, Site Gardener Beth Keiter led the group along the newly named André Michaux Trail. The hikers were greeted by an acre or more of trout lilies bathing the hillside in a sea of yellow petals and speckled green leaves. The Michaux exhibit is on display through the end of May. Michaux Programs

Walter Taylor as "Michaux in Florida" and Charlie Williams as "Michaux in the Carolinas" (and now Tennessee) have continued to present interpretative programs as the botanist in period costume. Recently, Walter has appeared before appreciative audiences in Orlando and in Daytona Beach. Charlie has performed his Michaux interpretation for a variety of groups in Asheville, Charlotte, Elizabethtown and Fayetteville, NC, Columbia and Greenville, SC, and Johnson City, TN. The Fayetteville Observer daily newspaper covered Charlie's public performance at the Fayetteville headquarters library as a news event, reporting that he "amused and informed 110 people." Charlie's next program will be September 10, 2004 in Highlands, NC for the Highland's Biological Station's native plant symposium.

Charlie is on a mission to raise the balance of the funds needed to publish the AMIS papers with honoraria from these programs. If you want a program for your group, contact Charlie.
